NEW STAMPS RELEASED

The President of Dravida Munnettra Kazhagam and the former Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu M Karunanidhi released the commemorative stamps on three eminent Tamils, freedom fighter and trade union leader Vi Kalyanasundaranar, eminent poet Kavimani Desiga Vinayagam Pillai, and social reformer cum educationist Ayothidasa Pandithar, on September 21, 2005 at Chennai. The function was presided over by the Minister for Communications and Information Technology, Dayanidhi Maran and attended by Tamil Nadu Congress Committee's President G K Vasan and Communist Party of India's National Secretary D Raja.

VI KALAYANASUNDARANAR

Vi Kalyanasundaranar, popularly known as Vi Ka was one of the prominent figures in Indian political life. He was an eminent scholar in Tamil, prolific writer, fiery speaker, trade union leader and a freedom fighter.

He was born on August 26, 1883 to Virudhachala Mudaliar and Chinnammal. After completing his education in Wesley High School, Royapettah, he joined as a teacher in the same school. He worked in several companies run by the English, but inspired by the ideals of Bal Gangadhar Tilak and the prevailing nationalist sentiments; he gave up his job and joined the freedom struggle. He was placed in house arrest.

In 1933, Kalyanasundaranar was closely associated with Mahatma Gandhi. Whenever Gandhi came to Chennai and addressed public meetings, Kalyanasundaranar translated his speeches into Tamil. It was he who started addressing Mahatma Gandhi as 'Gandhi Adigal'.

He did not hesitate to address the gatherings in Tamil. This encouraged others to feel proud of expressing themselves freely in their mother tongue i.e. Tamil while addressing public meetings at that time.

He started a labor union in 1918 in Chennai and organized a confederation of labor unions in 1920.

He started a newspaper 'Desa Bakthan' but it was banned by the British. Then he started another newspaper 'Nava Sakthi' and worked for the growth of Tamil language and to propagate nationalist ideals.

A great scholar, Kalyanasundaranar authored more than 50 books, the most popular being 'The Greatness of Women' in which he spread the ideals of national freedom, the growth of Tami1 language and literature, and social reforms, particularly emancipation of women in all walks of life.

His career was marked by nationalism, spiritual discipline, courage and compassion. He passed away on 17th September 1953, but his legacy lives on.

KAVIMANI DESIGA VINAYAGAM PILLAI

In the annals of 20th century Tamil literature, the name of S Desigavinayagam Pillai occupies a special place.

Born to Sivathanupillai and Adilakshmi at Theroor in the Princely state of Travancore now known as Kanyakumari District in Tamilnadu on July 27, 1876, Desigavinayagam Pillai had his early school education in Theroor and attended college at Nagarcoil. He started his career as a school teacher and after serving in one or two schools in Kottar and in Trivandrum, he joined Maharaja's college at Trivandrum as a lecturer in Tamil.

He composed his first Tamil poem at the age of 19. He wrote many songs for children which were published in 'Malarum Malayum' (Flower & Garland) in 1938. Asiya Jothi (Light of Asia), Nanjil Nattu Marumakkal Vazhi Manmiyam (a satire on society) and the translation of the work of Omarkhayyam are his master pieces.

Even now, his poems are taught in schools and colleges. His poems are marked by nobility of intent and simplicity of language. He had a good command over Malayalam and English and translated the work of some selected authors from English to Tamil. In 1940 the Tamil Sangam at its 7th annual conference held at Madras honored Desigavinayagam Pillai with the title 'Kavimani'.

He was also an epigraphist and studied many stone inscriptions in and around Kanyakumari and Nagarcoil. His research work 'KandalurSalai' was famous and was reprinted in the year 1953.

He adopted simple living and high thinking as his guiding principle. In 1948 Kavimani was offered the post of the Laureate which he refused and recommended the name of a contemporary Tamil poet for this post. He also showed unwillingness for the post of Honorary Professor of Tamil at Annamalai University.

A devout follower of Gandhi, he always wore khadi and use to spin the Charkha. He was deeply concerned with the uplift of the downtrodden.

The South Travancore Hindu College was his brain child. He retired from service in 1931 but even after retirement worked as a member of the Text Book Committee of Travancore state and also as a consultant for Tamil lexicon prepared by Madras University.

He breathed his last on September 26, 1954 at the age of 78 but till today Kavimani Desigavinayagam Pillai lives in the hearts and minds of people because of his noble deeds and legendary qualities.

AYOTHIDHASA PANDITHAR

A social reformer, educationist and visionary, Ayothidhasa Pandithar was far ahead of his time.

Ayothidhasa was born on May 20, 1845 in Coimbatore District of Tamil Nadu. He was named 'Kathavarayan' by his parents. After acquiring proficiency in Sidha medicine, he changed his name as Ayothidhasa Kaviraj Pandithar.

Ayothidhasa Pandithar established 'The Advaithantha Sabha' in Nilgiris in 1870 and 'Dravida Mahayana Sabha' in 1891.

A sincere social worker and philanthropist, he was a pioneer and forerunner to Dr B R Ambedkar and Periyar and campaigned against the caste system and untouchability besides advocating social equality. He took up the causes of the poor and the downtrodden and fought against orthodoxy. A man of action, Pandithar heralded a social revolution in Tamilnadu.

Pandithar published a weekly called 'Oru Paisa Thamizhan' in 1907. He wrote more than 20 books on various fields. A good orator, he was fluent in Tamil, Sanskrit, Pali and English. His views on the writings of Tiruvalluvar and Auvaiyar gave a new insight and different exposition in terms of Buddhism. He founded Chakkia Buddhist Association which evoked great response among social and political circles. He gave a new direction to Tamil Literature.

Pandithar passed away in 1914 but his views on social issues have left a lasting impact.

PRABODH CHANDRA

The Prime Minister of India Dr Manmohan Singh released a commemorative postage stamp in the denomination of rupees five to mark the birth anniversary of Prabodh Chandra, a great freedom fighter and a renowned writer, on October 24, 2005 at New Delhi in the presence of Dr Shakeel Ahmad, Minister of State for Communications & Information Technology and several other Ministers.

Born in Rawalpindi (now in Pakistan) on 24th October, 1911 (now in Pakistan) Prabodh Chandra did his graduation from Lahore. He started his political career at his age of 16 and formed the Multan Students Union in 1927. In his early days he was closely associated with the Lahore Revolutionary Party. Later he joined the Indian National Congress and was elected to the Punjab Legislative Assembly in 1946. After Independence also he continued as member of Punjab Assembly in 1952, 1960 and 1962. He was the first speaker of the Punjab legislative assembly. He had also been the Member of Parliament from 1971 to 1977. Chandra was also an accomplished writer and editor of English Monthly "The Students' Tribune" at Lahore in 1936. He had to his credit a number of contributions made in the form of articles to various journals and had brought out publications also.

COMING SOON E-PAYPOST

India Post is gearing up to launch software which would enable online payments and purchases even in the remotest corner of the country by using its network of over 150,000 post offices.

The Mysore-based software development centre of the department is developing an online payment gateway, e-Paypost, which will be integrated with various service providers to facilitate payments on the web. Customers can book a ticket on the net or make a purchase on the virtual gallery and make payments at the nearest post office within 24 hours. The goods would reach them, as in a normal online purchase. This will avoid the need to provide the credit card number online.

Jetair CEO Mahiyar M Sadri said on October 5, 2005 at Mumbai "The first phase of operations, which has an investment of US \$10 million by JetAir Business Solutions and franchisees, would be spread over three to five years," The retail outlets, mainly spread across metro cities, would be a one-stop shop and offer facilities including packaging, international shipping options, document, parcel and delivery related services, he added.UPS Asia Pacific Region President Ken Torok said "Mumbai would have a total of 25 stores and the first one would open in November 2005.

UPS has become the world's largest package delivery company and a leading global provider of specialized transportation and logistics services. FEDEX ANNOUNCES SERVICE EXPANSIONS

FedEx Express, a subsidiary of FedEx Corp., announced on October 20, 2005 the new service expansions in India providing customers with enhanced transit and cut-off times, increased cargo capacity and faster and more flexible access to the global marketplace.

FedEx also will be expanding service availability of FedEx International Priority Freight, FedEx International Express Freight and FedEx International Priority options for valuables and dangerous goods to more markets through the corporation's new trucking network. This new network will allow later pickup times from all key markets providing additional manufacturing or production time for its customers.

FedEx said it now leads the express industry in India with almost 3,500 people working for FedEx Express and its contractors, 250 FedEx branded retail outlets, and a transportation system connecting 4,348 cities and towns across India. Expanded operations and services will be effective November 1, 2005.

FAKE STAMP SCAM UPDATES

The Telgi scam involving the sale of fake stamps is probably one of the biggest scams unearthed in the country. From 1995 to 2003 when the fake stamp paper scam broke, an estimated Rs 300,000 million (US \$ 7 billion) worth of fake stamp papers had been sold across several states including Andhra Pradesh. The fake stamp papers seized have since become evidence in the CBI case. While the CBI is still probing the scam, officials in Andhra Pradesh allegedly have already destroyed several thousands of stamp papers. The Panthers Party of Jammu and Kashmir and the Janata Dal (S) claim the Andhra Pradesh government is destroying fake stamp papers and with it valuable evidence. State government documents produced by the two political parties reveal that on January 4, 2005, the Registration and Stamps Department of Andhra Pradesh destroyed close to Rs 6.1 million worth of stamp papers with a face value of Rs 500 and above. The Andhra Pradesh government, however, says that the stamp papers being destroyed are not the same as the Telgi stamp papers and they are only being destroyed to ensure that fakes are not in circulation. But both political parties have now written to the President asking for a probe. They have alleged that the latest move is aimed at completely destroying all further links to the Telgi scam in which several senior police officers, politicians and government officials are implicated.

ALSO IN THE NEWS

INVERTED JENNY FETCHES \$3 MILLION

An anonymous buyer paid US\$ 2.97 million (Rs 13.37 Crore) including buyers premium for a unique block of 4 stamps of 24 cent US Airmail stamp of 1918 with inverted center popularly known as 'Inverted Jenny'. This, the only plate number block of this famous error was sold in Sale 901 at Siegel Auction Galleries. New York for the World-Record Price for a US Philatelic Item on October 19, 2005.

The stamps bear a picture of a Curtiss JN-4 plane, known as a Jenny, which was used for training pilots in World War I and later became an airmail plane.

Only one sheet of 100 stamps all with inverted center error was bought by a young stamp collector William Robey in 1918 at a post office in Washington DC. It was later broken up into smaller blocks and individual stamps to be resold.
