#### THE CONTROVERSIAL BRITISH CHRISTMAS STAMPS

The objections and protests by the Hindu Forum of Britain, an umbrella organization of the 260 Hindu organizations in the UK forced Royal Mail to apologize to the Hindu Community and later to partially withdraw one of the stamps from the set of six.

The 68p stamp depicts Madonna and Child, a 17<sup>th</sup> century painting from India of the holy family with St. Anne. The man and woman pictured on the stamp have Hindu markings on their foreheads but are shown worshipping the infant Jesus. Ramesh Kallidai of the Hindu Forum of Britain called the issue of the stamp "insensitive and inappropriate."

The protests started immediately after the stamps were issued on November 1, 2005. Royal Mail responded by apologizing "for any unintentional offence caused to the Hindu community" but refused to withdraw the stamps. Royal Mail also said that it would review its procedures to ensure that future images are screened to avoid unintentional offense to any community in the United Kingdom.

However the he Hindu Forum was not satisfied and on November 3, 2005 outlined its planned protests over the stamp, including the mass mailing of letters without stamps to Royal Mail's headquarters in London to clog local post offices.

On November 4, 2005 the Department of Trade & Industry and the Royal Mail held the discussions which resulted in a decision to inform the Post Office branches that "the 68 pence Christmas stamp only be offered when specifically requested by a customer. The standard default issue for 68 pence stamps should be the definitive stamp or any other 68 pence special stamp you have in stock. Please note – no further stocks of this stamp will be issued to branches."

The situation is set to become even stickier for the Royal Mail, however, as it has emerged that exception is also likely to be taken to virtually every stamp in the new set by evangelical Christians. North Antrim DUP Member of the Legislative Assembly Mervyn Storey is one member of that faith who has already sent a letter of complaint. "Each of the Christmas issue depicts an image of a Madonna and child," he said. "This in itself is offensive to the many thousands of mainstream evangelical Christians in Northern Ireland, but this hurt is exacerbated by the fact that on each of the stamps the Madonna figure is presented as having a halo around her head, clearly signifying that she is to be revered."While it may not have been the intention of the Royal Mail, the clear inference to be deducted from these stamps is that the birth of Jesus Christ is a Roman Catholic thing and that the beliefs and feelings of mainstream evangelicals is to be afforded less respect and recognition than those of our Roman Catholic neighbors. "Whatever the intention behind these stamps, this is an unacceptable situation which I know from my discussions with others from within the mainstream evangelical community in Northern Ireland is being viewed as insulting."

Royal Mail (the British Post Office) issued a set of 6 special stamps for Christmas on November 1, 2005. The images of the Madonna and Child for these special stamps were selected by artist Irene von Treskow, award winning designer, illustrator and Anglican priest from European, Haitian, Italian, Indian, Native American and Aboriginal Australian backgrounds. Her idea was to visually depict the Madonna and Child from all five continents.

De La Rue printed the self-adhesive stamps by gravure in sheets of 50. The first-class and the second-class stamp were also produced in booklets of 12 and of 24 stamps respectively. A souvenir sheet including all the six stamps with the regular lick and stick gum was also issued.

The stamp for the domestic second-class (21p) rate is non-denominated. It is inscribed " $2^{nd}$ " and features a Black Madonna and Child painting by an unknown artist from the Haitian culture.

The stamp for the domestic first-class (30p) rate is also non-denominated. It is inscribed "1st" and depicts Madonna and Child, a painting by Marianne Stokes. Stokes born in 1855 in Southern Austria, painted the Madonna and Child around 1907-08 in Ragusa, Italy.

The 42p stamp for the European basic rate up to 20 grams, shows The Virgin Mary With the Infant Christ, a European school color lithograph from circa 1900.

The 60p denomination for the European airmail rate up to 40 grams, pictures Choctow Virgin Mother and Child. John B Giuliani, a Catholic priest, painted this image of the Mother and Child as Choctaw Indians in 1995.

Illustrated on the 68p stamp for the airmail basic letter rate to the rest of the world up to 20 grams is a Mughal painting from India dated from circa 1620 to 1630. This painting, Madonna and Infant Jesus, belongs to the collection of the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vastu Sangrahalaya (formerly the Prince of Wales Museum) in

The £1.12 value of the set for the airmail rate up to 40 grams for the rest of the world reproduces Come Let Us Adore Him, a painting in colored sand by Dianne Tchumut and from the Merrepen Arts Aboriginal Corporation of Northern Australia.

Royal Mail has been issuing Christmas stamps annually since 1966, but it has been six years since Royal Mail issued a set of Christmas stamps with a religious theme. Royal Mail announced that it plans to issue nonreligious and religious Christmas stamps in alternate years.

## COLLECTORS EXCHANGE STAMPS WORTH MILLIONS

Bond investor Bill Gross of Newport Beach, California, USA anonymously purchased the block of four 24-cent 1918 air mail stamps known as the Inverted Jenny Block for \$2.97 million on October 19, 2005(see this column in Issue 244 of October 27, 2005).

He then traded them on November 2, 2005 for the single stamp missing from his 300-stamp collection: a small, blue 1-cent stamp bearing the image of Franklin, printed in 1868, known as "the Z Grill" because of the waffle-like grill pattern pressed into the back.

Gross now has the only complete collection of 19th-century US stamps.

Charles Shreve, the stamp dealer and auctioneer who arranged the exchange said "Not even the Smithsonian's National Postal Museum in Washington has one of everything."
